

Pre-arrival Documents (1)

Carry on:

- All documents for customs (we'll go over that in a moment)
- All electronics & outlet adapters
- All prescription medicine and doctor's notes
- A change of clothes (for 2 days) in case your luggage gets lost
- Toothbrush & daily toiletries



Packing Tips: Advice from Alumni

- Do research on the local weather and fashion

- Travel sized toiletries
- Medicines & contact lens solution
- Neutral and interchangeable clothing & comfortable shoes
- Embrace a minimalist lifestyle



Packing Tips: What To Avoid

WE RECOMMEND YOU DO NOT BRING:

- Prized possessions: heirloom jewelry, irreplaceable tokens, etc. It's not worth the risk of losing an item.
- Too many clothes chances are you'll want to acquire some new stuff!
- Anything you can't carry
- Locked cell phones



Documents for Customs

REMEMBER TO CARRY:

- Your Passport!
- Photocopies of your PASSPORT and printout of your CISI (medical insurance) card.

Note: Stamps in your passport are digital




Staying in Contact While Abroad

CELL PHONE PLAN:

 Students MUST have a cell phone number where they can be contacted while studying in Buenos Aires.



- Having a working cell phone is a requirement for program participation
- You've got Options:
- International Plan (You get this from your US provider)
- Getting a local SIM Card (The staff will provide you with a local SIM Card)
- Unlock your phone prior to travel



Money Matters

- Inform Your Bank That You'll Be Abroad
 - If you don't they may block your card for suspicious activity
- Bring at least 400 U.S. dollars in cash (bills of 100 USD)
- Credit cards are accepted, but at a different exchange rate



Have a Plan: Budgeting Guidelines

Develop A Personal Budget:

- Expenses are dependent upon your lifestyle! Some students will spend less and others more. To create your budget, think about:
 - How many meals do you plan on eating outside your housing?
 - How important are clothes, souvenirs, or physical items to you?
 - Do you plan to take any weekend trips outside of planned activities? (transportation, food, activities, accommodations)
 - Snacks, toiletries, and discretionary
 - o The basics: laundry, cell phone plan, medicine
- Students in Buenos Aires usually spend between \$50 \$100 per week, depending on their personal habits (homestay or apartment)



Arrival and Discovery Week

What To Do When You Arrive:

- Pickup at Buenos Aires airport and transportation to housing is provided on August 28th
 - Plan to arrive between 6AM 5PM
- Get your luggage, exit baggage claim, and look for the Verto staff there (t-shirts and signs!) More info in your Student Portal
- Shuttle will leave every couple hours and take you to your new home

In-Person Orientation:

- Discovery week starts the day after arrival and your attendance is required

Follow Your Code Of Responsibility:

Community Values, Care Teams and Verto Discovery

Tips For Life In Buenos Aires:

- Life in Buenos Aires: a warm and welcoming people!
- Safety:
 - Don't make yourself a target by walking with airpods, flashing your phones, or carrying your wallet in your back pocket
 - Walk with friends after dark
 - Let others know where you're going
 - Use the independent travel form when traveling outside of Buenos Aires
 - Don't accept drinks from strangers
 - Carry a bag with a zipper and keep it in front or your body



Alcohol Safety

Following Your Code Of Responsibility:

- Because you are 18 years of age, you have reached the legal drinking age in Buenos Aires
- You are legally allowed to consume alcohol in Buenos Aires (not possess it in Verto facilities)
- You are NOT permitted to use alcohol in an irresponsible way or to abuse alcohol
- Being a "drunken American" wandering the streets puts you and your peers at risk and makes you a target
- Code of responsibility violations can lead to serious consequences up to dismissal





Academic Facility:

Study Center:

- You will take courses at our Study Center located within the heart of Buenos Aires' commercial and social center.
- The facility includes classrooms, study space, indoor/outdoor common areas to hang out and study, air conditioning, and WIFI.



City Food

- Argentine cuisine is a blending of Mediterranean influences brought by the Spanish during the colonial period, and later by Italian and other European immigrants.
- Social gatherings involve sharing a meal. Sunday family lunch is considered the most significant meal of the week.
- Most regions of Argentina are known for their beef-oriented diet.
- Breakfast is small and consists of coffee (or mate) and pastry. In most parts of Argentina, lunch is the largest meal of the day. Dinner after 9pm.

 - If you're open to gaining a new family you just might!


